Vivekananda Foundation is a Federation of Voluntary Organisations and individuals committed to the cause of the development of poor and marginalised section of the society. These organisations have been working in various sectors of social service such as Tribal Development, Rehabilitation of Blind and Orphans, Mental Health, Rural Health and Education, Vocational Training and Community Organisation. This federation is inspired and guided by the ideals of the Ramakrishna Mission.

### Objectives:

- To establish a network of organisations and individuals who have started service activities inspired by the ideals of Swami Vivekananda.
- Sharing, helping and exchanging ideas amongst the member organisations and individuals.
- To promote, assist and take up activities for the integrated development of the people with special emphasis on the marginalised and the poor in the areas of Health, Education, Vocation Training and the like for their development.
- To promote, assist and guide individuals and voluntary organisations inspired by the ideals of Swami Vivekananda, who seek help from the foundation.

The handing over of a PHC (Primary Health Centre) at Thithimathi in Coorg District is a landmark beginning of the Foundation. It eloquently speaks of the need to decentralize health services and hand them over to voluntary sector and the decision of the Government to this effect has been taken in this backdrop. The Primary Health Centre at Thithimathi and its associated sub-centres in the Tribal area had remained neglected and almost stopped functioning.

The formal take-over ceremony of the PHC took place on the 17th June 1996 in the presence of Hon'ble Health Minister of the Government of Karnataka, the monks of the Ramakrishna Mission and many dignitaries like Mr M N Chittiyappa of BCK Group.

Vivekananda Foundation soon after taking over the PHC at Thithimathi immediately set to improvise the infrastructure - repair of buildings, drinking water facilities, electricity etc. Vivekananda Foundation has spent Rs.6 lakhs for the renovation of PHC building and staff quarters. This has been possible with the generous donations from BCK Group.

The PHC at Thithimathi started functioning soon. The Medical and Paramedical staff were given the necessary orientation training at the Vivekananda Youth Movement H.D. Kote), a member organisation of the Vivekananda Foundation. Dr. Balasubramaniam and Dr. H Sudarshan have been regularly monitoring the PHC. The health programmes were specially designed to reach the interior villages.

With the earnest effort of BCK Group an ambulance has been donated to the Vivekananda Foundation by Jan Mangal Samstha. The ambulance services have been a great boon to the Tribal population in the interiors of the forest.

## Progress Report

1998 - 99

### 1. MCH and Family Welfare (RCH Programme):

Six *Tribal ANMs* specially trained to work in tribal areas have been in-charge of the sub-centres. They have provided Anti-natal care to all the pregnant mothers - Registered them before 12 weeks and checked Blood Pressure, examined urine for Albumin and sugar, blood for Hb% and gave Tetanus Toxide Injections to all of them. They also conducted deliveries and provided Post-natal care. Iron-Folic acid tablets (IFA) -prophylactic and therapeutic doses were provided to all pregnant women.

*CNA Approach* - The ANMs made a survey of their population and prepared *Action Plans* for 1999 - 2000 based on the needs of the community.

*Tubectomy and Laproscopic surgeries* were done periodically at the PHC with the help of qualified Surgeons, not only for the PHC population but also to the neighbouring PHCs. The *Operation Theater* is well equipped and good quality services are provided. *Lady Medical Officer* has been conducting deliveries at PHC in a well maintained Labour room and the *Institutional Deliveries* have increased considerably compared to previous years.

### 2. Immunisation:

100% immunisation has been provided to all the pregnant women and all the children have been immunised for BCG, DPT, Polio and Measles. Cold Chain is maintained well with the help of IL Refrigerator and Deep Freezers.

#### 4. Curative services:

The curative services are available at PHC throughout the year and emergency medical services were provided 24-hours a day. Periodically, specialists also provided their services to the PHC. Qualified Surgeons and Ob & G specialists are visiting the PHC regularly and providing *Specialist services*.

#### 5. Health Education & School Health Programme:

This was carried out through individual contact, counseling, group discussion, audio tapes, exhibitions and posters. Health checkup was conducted in various schools at Thithimathi, Devarapura, Nellikadu, Hebbale, Athur, Edethore. The causes and prevention of diseases such as TB, Leprosy, Malaria, were explained to the school children. Along with that, personal hygiene, usage of iodised salt, importance of nutrition, dental care were explained. The Anganwadi and School teachers were also made aware of the above facts.

#### 6. Nutrition:

Nutrition is provided to under-5 children through Anganwadi in the PHC area under ICDS scheme. PHC supervised the Nutritional Monitoring, health checkups, immunisation of children and provided health and nutrition education.

#### 7. Safe drinking water and sanitation :

PHC has taken up the responsibility of providing safe drinking water by chlorination of over-head tanks, wells and also created awareness about safe drinking water, sanitation and construction of sanitation latrine.

#### 8. Provision of essential drugs :

The PHC is committed to providing essential drugs and all the essential drugs are made available at the PHC. Rational drug therapy is practiced in the PHC.

#### 2. Community Participation:

The PHC ensured the *Equitable Distribution* of Primary health services by ensuring access of health services to the poor and the marginalised especially SC and ST communities by special efforts.

Participated in the *Grama Panchayat* meetings at Thithimathi and Devarapura.

*Village Health Committees (VHCs)* have been set up and these provide support in various health activities in all the sub-centres.

*Mahila Swastha Sanghas* were involved in all health programmes - motivation for sterilisations, immunisations - and they participated in group discussions.

*Local resources* have been mobilised for the effective functioning of the PHC.

10. The *appropriate health technology*, like ORT, traditional medicine, are promoted in the area and the health staff are provided suitable training to do this. Eight distribution centres were opened at the village-level for distributing ORS packets for treating diarrhoea cases.

11. Efforts are being made to ensure *Multi-sectorial approach* for the integrated development of the people by the convergence of various services at community level - Health, Education, ICDS, Panchayat Raj Institution, Public Engineering etc.

12. Effective *Referral services* are being provided from sub-centre to PHC, PHC to Taluka & District Hospitals. Our ambulance is very useful in providing referral services. In addition specialist services are also made available at PHC.

#### Trainings to the various staff of PHC :

1. Training on "Community Participation" at B R Hills for 3 days.
2. B H E Orientation Training Programme from 19.11.98 to 01.12.98 at Mandya Training Centre.
3. Medical Officers Orientation Training Programme from 14.12.98 to 30.12.98 at Mandya Training Centre.
4. Short term training course on TB Control from 07.12.98 to 11.12.98 for the Medical Officer, field staff at the National Institute of Tuberculosis.
5. Training on Mental health, Epilepsy and tuberculosis from 12.03.98 to 14.03.98 at B R Hills for field staff.
6. TFA and CNA training programme at Madikere to the field staff.

#### 14. Liaison with the Government:

We had excellent co-operation and support at the Directorate and Secretariat level. However, we had many difficulties and hardships at the District Health Office level due to the mis-understanding of the purpose of the collaboration of NGO and the Government in providing Primary Health Care to the people. The formation of high power committee to bring about the collaboration is a good step and we look forward to better partnership at the District Level.

**15. Constraints and Problems:**

1. The staff quarters need to be repaired. The grants for building repairs under IPP-9 project is yet to be sanctioned
2. The non-availability of IFA and Vit 'A' drops.
3. The field staff are not being reimbursed by Z.P. the TA/DA for their various visits.
4. Frequent failure of electricity system affected the proper functioning and hence a standby generator is required.

6. Lack of co-operation from DHOs office.

## Major Achievements of Thithimathi PHC since July 1996

### 1. Infrastructure:

- details ?*
- a) *Buildings*: The delapidated building of PHC- hospital building, Medical officers Quarters, Staff Nurse quarters and Majjigehalla Sub-centre were repaired at a cost of Ra. 6 lakhs.
  - b) *Drinking water* supply was provided.
  - c) *Electricity supply* to all the buildings restored after paying the arrears (Rs. 11,000/-) to KEB and repairing the electrical installations.
  - d) The *hospital premises* and the garden is being maintained regularly by the BCK Plantation.

### 2. Hospital:

- a) *Labour Room* has been renovated and equipped.
  - b) *Operation theater* was constructed and equipped to conduct surgeries.
  - c) *Lady Medical Officer* and Staff Nurse are available all the 24 hrs. to conduct deliveries and other medical emergencies. In addition *another Medical Officer* has also been made available at our own cost to the PHC.
  - d) *Essential drugs* are made available throughout the year

### 3. Specialist Services.

- a) Regular *Leprosy and Tubectomy* camps by qualified Surgeons.
- b) *Dental Clinics* - by Dental Surgeons.
- c) *Obstetrician & Gynecologist* visits PHC regularly.

### 4. Ambulance services:

A fully equipped ambulance service is available at PHC for various medical emergencies, Immunisation Programme and Family Planning programme.

### 5. Sickle Cell Anemia Screening programme:

Tribal people suffer from a genetic disease called *Sickle Cell Anemia*. Our Laboratory is well equipped to diagnose Sickle Cell Anemia by Turbidity test and Electrophoresis.

### 6. Improvement in the Health Status of PHC Population.

The Crude Birth Rate, Crude Death Rate, Infant Mortality Rate, Child Mortality Rate, Under five Mortality Rate, Still Birth Rate, Perinatal Mortality Rate, Neo-natal Mortality Rate, Post natal Mortality Rate, Maternal Mortality Rate of the PHC area are better than the District, State and National Level Figures.

Mother and child care Family Planning programme and Immunisation Programmes have achieve grater success compared to District, State and National Level. (Details are enclosed)

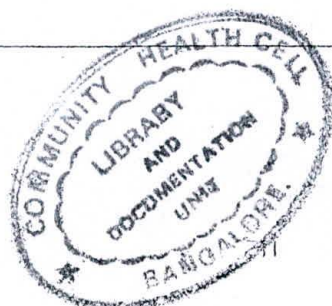

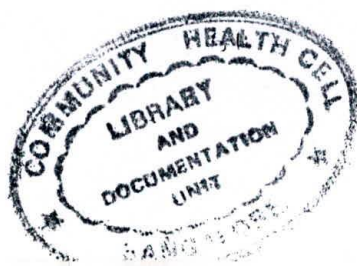
