


This mascots of the 9th ICAAP are named *Wayan* and *Putu*, names which are traditionally given to the first, fifth and/or ninth child in the Balinese family. Both names apply to any gender. Since this is the 'ninth child', we are using those names for our mascots. To make it easier for Indonesians to pronounce "ICAAP", the mascots' second names have been spelled the Indonesian way: *Aikep*. The Mascots are created by Bog-Bog, a Bali-based cartoon magazine.

BICC - GROUND FLOOR DIRECTORY









Program Structure

Plenary Sessions

Experts on HIV-related subject matters will be invited from around the region to give plenary lectures during the Congress. This will be a great opportunity to listen to the world's most distinguished researchers, community leaders and policy specialists. Plenary Sessions will be held every morning from 10 August to 13 August 2009.

Oral Sessions

Each session consists of ten-minute presentations by each speaker, followed by questions and answers. The 9th ICAAP deals with diverse topics which are divided into four tracks, namely:

TRACK A - Understanding the Epidemic and Strengthening Prevention Efforts

This track focuses on the dynamics of the AIDS epidemic in Asia and the Pacific and the ongoing efforts to prevent HIV transmission, with special attention to empowerment and partnership strategies. At the global level, this region's AIDS epidemic is overshadowed by the epidemic in Africa. Still, the number of infected and affected people is growing fast and there are pockets of high incidence. Focus has been on so-called risk groups, but in a number of countries new infections predominantly occur among women with single partners and adolescents.

TRACK B - Strengthening Partnership for Treatment, Care, and Support

This track deals with quality improvement in care, support and treatment through broadening partnership in clinical research, capacity building of PLHIV and related professionals and workers, improving the health system by scaling up response and integration of related services, successful identification of a comprehensive set of evidence-based interventions that could significantly reduce the incidence and impact of HIV and AIDS and improve the quality of care.

TRACK C - HIV/AIDS in Context: Understanding and Addressing Socio-Cultural. Economic and Political Determinants

This track focuses on the socio-cultural, political and economic context of HIV/AIDS. It examines the manifestations of the epidemic in specific settings, its impacts, and the ways structural determinants affect the response to it. Issues ranging from globalisation, market liberalisation, migration, climate change, hiking oil prices, and scarcity of food to poverty and ethnic diversity all affect vulnerability to HIV infection, morbidity and mortality as well as prevention, treatment and care strategies.

TRACK D - Leadership and Broadening the Response

This track attempts to bring out examples of policies and programs at the local, national, bilateral or multilateral level that demonstrate genuine commitment of the political leaders, their partners in the private sector, and in the community. The Asia-Pacific region is known to have isolated communities due to its geographical nature or cultural background.

Poster Presentation

Posters will be on display on 10 - 12 August 2009 from 09.00 to 18.00. There will be different posters each day. Presenters are requested to stand by their posters during lunchtime (12.15 – 14.15) on their designated day.

Satellite Meetings

Satellite Meetings will take place during lunchtime and evening, organised and operated by several companies, government agencies, institutions or non-governmental organisations. There are 75 satellite meetings and some are open only for selected delegates invited to the meeting.

Skills Building Workshops

There are thirty-two (32) skills-building workshops at this Congress. Skills-building workshops are considered as one of the important components of the Congress which requires skills and experience as well as technical know-how. Through these workshops, conference delegates will have the opportunity to improve various skills they can apply to their daily work in communities and organisations.

Symposia

There are twenty four (24) symposia hosted by various organisations, where invited speakers and lecturers will discuss cross-track issues. Several symposia will take place simultaneously each day in three ume blocks after the plenary sessions and are open for all delegates.

Asia Pacific Village

The Asia-Pacific Village aims to bring the diversity of our region and our congress together in a space where our differences are celebrated. The Asia-Pacific Village will provide a place where we can both interact and engage on a personal level, sharing all our combined experiences, knowledge and skills, build coalitions, and promote interactive learning among communities living with and affected by HIV and AIDS including policy makers, researchers and other groups in the community.

Congress Field Trips

Congress Field Trips

The organizing committee has planned a number of field trips to local organisations with HIV & AIDS prevention and treatment programs, which may be of interest to the delegates. The field trips will take place during lunch time (12.15 – 14.00) on 10, 11 and 12 August 2009 at places relatively close to the congress venue (BICC), which are Denpasar, Sanur and Kuta (30 - 45 minutes drive). The field trips are free of charge, but the number of delegates in each trip is limited to 20 persons only, on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration for the field trips can be done on site during the congress. Transportation will be provided, but lunch will not be provided. All field trips will commence from designated pick-up points at BICC complex.

Post Congress Field Trips

The 9th ICAAP is also offering delegates the opportunity to visit the district of Buleleng (North Bali) or Gianyar (Central Bali) after the Congress from 14 - 15 August 2009 to see directly the HIV program activities as well as cultural performances and local attractions.

Pre Congress Community Forum

The Community Forum was historically convened by the Coalition of Asia Pacific Regional Networks on AIDS as part of the pre-ICAAP program. On the 9th ICAAP for the first time the Community Forum will take place more than one day. There will be eight (8) break out forums from 7 - 8 August designed to reflect the main concerns of each community and is organized by respective sub-committees of the organisers along with an international counterpart. About 500 civil society representatives from the Asia-Pacific region along with some pre-identified experts, donors, other stakeholders, and human rights activists are expected to participate. The sessions will include plenary presentations and discussions, as well as breakouts and other activities deemed appropriate by the respective organizers. The Community Forum will end on 9 August 2009 morning, when all the groups gather to share the outcomes of their respective forums which will be presented at the Opening Ceremony.

Official & Social Program

OPENING CEREMONY

Sunday, 9 August 2009

The 9th ICAAP opening ceremony will take place at 19.00 at Lotus Pond, Garuda Wisnu Kencana (GWK) Cultural Park in Bali and will be proceeded with a Welcome Reception. President of the Republic of Indonesia, H.E. H. DR. Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, is expected to officially open the congress. The Cultural Park is located at Bukit Ungasan, Jimbaran Bali with an enourmous statue of Garuda Wisnu Kencana as its landmark. Delegates will be required to arrive an hour before the ceremony starts for security check.

Sunday, 9 August 2009

Welcome Reception will take place immediately after the Opening Ceremony in Lotus Pond, Garuda Wisnu Kencana Cultural Park - Nusa Dua, Bali. It will be a great opportunity to meet other participants and prepare yourself for a productive and enjoyable Congress by enjoying its frst social event. All registered delegates are invited to attend.

CLOSING CEREMONY

Thursday, 13 August 2009

The 9th ICAAP Closing Ceremony will take place on August 13th, at Bali International Convention Center (BICC) in Nusa Dua, Bali, Indonesia. Coordinating Minister for People's Welfare is scheduled to close the congress. The ceremony will be held immediately after the Rapporteur Session and the last plenary session. All delegates are invited to attend.

AIDS AMBASSADOR MEETING

The Indonesian First Lady and National AIDS Ambassador, H.E. Hj Ani Bambang Yudhoyono will co-host an AIDS Ambassadors' Meeting during the 9th ICAAP, together with the Australian AIDS Ambassador, Hon. Murray Proctor. The AIDS Ambassadors' Meeting will address the role of AIDS Ambassadors in the Asia and Pacific region and how they can be mobilized for greater action and accountability for the response. In order to achieve this, countries will need to tackle legislative barriers and actively work with civil society organisations and people living with HIV to create an enabling environment and reach marginalized groups.

MoSM16 Repealing Anti-Sodomy Law: Lessons From and Challenges in Asia and Pacific

The Asia – Pacific region presents a mixed slate on criminalization of adult same sex sexual activity, with 24 States prohibiting such conduct. Criminalisation poses enormous challenges in addressing HIV needs among the disproportionately affected MSM communities and presents a direct barrier to providing relevant HIV prevention, treatment and care services, thus impeding their right to health. Asia has also seen many legal interventions against anti-sodomy laws – including the most recent judicial orders by the Delhi High Court in India repealing proscriptions against adult consensual sex between men. This unparalleled pronouncement reaffirming the right to privacy, dignity, health, equality and non-discrimination against sexual minorities has enthused community and rights activists and presents lessons for other Asian countries that continue to criminalize same sex acts. This session will therefore explore legal strategies against criminal laws targeting MSM in the region, bringing forth experiences of legal repression and reform from community members and sharing lessons from past efforts and successes of legal reform.

MoSB41 Being Assertive: One Strategy for HIV Prevention Among Others

Conceptual formulations of HIV risk reduction and many HIV prevention interventions emphasize the role of sexual assertiveness, negotiation, and communication skills as key elements for enacting behavior change.

Assertiveness is the ability to express yourself and your rights without violating the rights of others. It is appropriately direct, open, and honest communication which is self-enhancing and expressive

Finding from previous study showed that individuals with high objectively rated sexual assertiveness skill had the lowest number of unprotected sex acts, the smallest number of different sexual partners, the smallest number of casual sex partners, and the highest levels of condom-protected sex in the past 30 days. Individuals with poor sexual assertiveness role-play skills had the highest levels of sexual risk behavior.

- To recognize the differences between being passive, assertive and aggressive through exploration of personal reaction
- To encourage participants to be assertive in the most appropriate and effective way especially in HIV and AIDS prevention.

During the past few years, little attention in meeting the prevention needs of people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA). HIV prevention was merely done for HIV negatives to keep them negative, ignoring the central role of PLHIV. Positive prevention programs are aimed at avoiding re-infections and cross-infections among PLHA as well as HIV transmission from positive people to other people.

The concept of positive prevention is relatively new in most of countries. However, international experiences suggest that, a comprehensive strategy of HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment should address positive prevention. Women Parliamentarians Addressing Feminization of HIV/AIDS

While progress has been made in the response to HIV/AIDS over the decades, it still remains a considerable challenge, several worldwide and regional trends point to the need for an even stronger, more integrated and gender sensitive advocacy to the epidemics. At the end of 2007, it was estimated that more than 33 million adults worldwide are living with HIV and AIDS and half of them are women. The study also shows that over 60% of 15-24 years olds living with HIV are young women. A recent UN study reveals the percentage of adults living with HIV/AIDS who are women have increased in all region surveyed, indicating a worrisome "feminization" of the epidemic. Available evidence from the region and elsewhere indicates that the current global economic crisis is likely to have a significant impact on people living with HIV and their households. The loss of jobs, particularly in export and labour intensive sectors, and cutbacks in AIDS funding will have serious short term and long term impact on the health and wellbeing of people living with HIV. At the macro level, key prevention aspects of the national AIDS programmes and long term ART commitments are likely to be compromised by the sudden shortfalls in resources. Thousands of people could be pushed out of treatment and already vulnerable HIV households could be subjected to additional stress. The symposium will present and discuss emerging evidence on the issue from key studies of WB, ADB and UNDP, and provide government and PLHIV perspectives.

In the midst of the current financial and economic crisis there are likely to be both direct and indirect consequences for migrant labor supply and demand. A two-way increase is expected in the movement of people: overseas migrants returning home after losing their jobs, or those recently laid off at home moving overseas in search of work. As some countries may take increasingly protectionist stances, the options for formal migration may narrow. Migrants abroad may also face increasingly difficult conditions, with fewer employment opportunities and may encounter greater discrimination and stigmatization. Of particular concern, is the likely impact on the lives and jobs of millions of documented and undocumented migrant workers in the region, and their access to health services.

The Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) Chair: Mr. Nasruddin, Director General of the Ministry of Religious Affairs, Indonesia

Stigma and discrimination have been identified as major barriers to universal access in the region. They impede prevention efforts by excluding most at risk communities from services, make easy access and use of prevention commodities difficult, delay testing and disclosure of HIV status, and make treatment and care risky. Religion and cultural beliefs and practices are often the source of the values that underlie stigma, and can therefore be a way to overcome these barriers. Often, it is a particular interpretation of religious writings/teaching and simultaneously there are opportunities for greater acceptance and positive approaches within the same religion.

This session seeks to bring together the 4 major faiths in the region-Islam, Christanity, Hinduism and Buddhism to:

a) To identify specific niches in each faith which provide the space for acceptance of MARPS with respect and dignity



Incorporating Harm Reduction Strategies within the Existing Social, Cultural and Religious Frameworks

Malaysian AIDS Council (MAC)

Statistics as at 31 Dec 2006 show that out of 76,000 HIV cases in Malaysia, 59,000 are IDUs, many due to the use of contaminated needles. Plans for harm reduction program in Malaysia prior to 2005 and even after have always been contentious as methods such as condom distribution, needle exchange, and Methadone maintenance therapy are often perceived as contradicting the Malaysian culture. Despite this, in 2006, the Malaysian government embarked on harm reduction initiatives by funding programs to provide clean needles and condoms to IDUs in three major cities. Favourable evaluation results after the initial pilot of two years saw the Ministry of Health Disease Control Unit declare the "Harrn Reduction Program" effective. Since February 2006, nine NSEP sites have been established across Malaysia with service provisions through outreach and drop in centres. At the end of the pilot phase, a total of 10,948 IDUs were reached with 769,132 numbers of needles and syringes distributed.

Participants will learn about interactive ways to address HIV/AIDS prevention sessions, using parts of the Daku (Dunia Remajaku Seru!) curriculum.

Method: selected teachers will facilitate the sessions, assisted by students and NGO staff. Students reported gaining improved knowledge, positive attitude and skills. They considered computer-based method as very attractive and fit to their culture. Teachers and schools also reported positively on their participation in the program. A series of trainings provide teachers with required knowledge, attitudes and skills to discuss sensitive issues and help them become open-minded and less prescribing their own norms. Teachers also reported improvements in teaching methodology and their relationships with students.



Exhibition Map






